


With these few words I welcome you to the second issue of the MMF newsletter.



After Graduation, What Next?



"Consider moving back in with your parents. Less stress, less financial demands and more time to look for a job. Plus a daily dose of advice might be a good source of motivation. Sorry parents..It is a sign of the times."

Another graduation, another time to celebrate, another time for the graduates to throw their hats up in the air; this time, not so much to symbolically toss off the rigors of academic work as to throw caution to the wind. Here we come, they might say, to an uncertain world where our academic qualifications may not amount to much more than the pristine certificates that we have been handed.

As the young graduates walk out of the gates of the various universities, many of them will be thinking very hard about their next step. Leaving University no longer offers any guarantees for much needed employment these days. And even for those that will be lucky to find employment, translating much of what has been learnt in the lecture halls into the practical realities of today's competitive world of work remains an uphill task.

Many graduates leave universities with only what is termed as "basic skills" grounded mainly in theoretical knowledge and less on practical skills. This spells a daunting task on their part. Before thinking of heavy pay cheques, graduates need to identify places where they can work as volunteers to achieve much needed experience and contacts. They also need to contact professional bodies to connect them to companies where they can do internships.

There is concern among recruiters today about the preparedness (or lack of it) of today's graduates to take on the world of work. And it is not about them lacking experience. Many of them lack the exposure to enable them compete. Today's university graduates fail badly at presentation skills, expression, etiquette and focus. From inappropriate dress codes to informal accents during job interviews, this makes their responsibility to take on demanding job questionable. This therefore, brings in factors like ability to adhere to work environments, up bringing and socialization into focus. People's family back ground and other non academic values are crucial in this regard.

So how does the Alumni Association help, one may ask. There is no better chance for job seekers to meet potential employers than through networking. The Association offers a platform for one to exhibit their working potential through making contributions such as writing for the newsletter, university visits to encourage upcoming Alumni and "defending your classification" to your colleagues. A network of friends provides the greatest opportunity for development and culture and unity.

Now is the time to be aggressive, and go into commando mode. Use new tools and technology to help with your job search. Join LinkedIn, start a Facebook page that focuses on your professional persona.

Here are more tips you can adopt:

Consider moving back in with your parents. Less stress, less financial demands and more time to look for a job. Plus a daily dose of advice might be a good source of motivation. Sorry parents..It is a sign of the times.

If you can't find a job, try volunteering or an unpaid internship. This is a great opportunity to hone your skills and make connections in your field of study.

Network, network, network. Don't just rely on the Internet...you must meet people in person. As the old adage goes, 'sometimes it's more about WHO you know than WHAT you know.'

Practice your interview skills! – join groups of friends or fellow graduates and fine-tune your presentation skills.

Research companies you are interested in. Don't just send out gobs of resumes to every Tom, Dick and Harry. Refine your search and make sure you are polished when given the opportunity to make a connection.

Research the person you are meeting with. Did you go to the same school or have the same hobbies? This is a great way to start the conversation and make the interviewer like you. Remember...people hire people they like, and that person may not be the best person on paper.

Focus on entry level jobs even if they are not in your field. You need to add business experience to your resume. You may also have to get your hands dirty.

From 'Village Kid' to 'Gifted Man'

I was born and grew up in a very poor family, in fact we were poor to the extent that even the poor neighbors used to refer to us as the poor!(literary, they meant that despite the fact that they were poor, we were poorer!).

My parents supported me up to primary six when they plunged into serious financial and consequential marital challenges which saw them flee home and leave me and my little sister then as 'village kids' (word for street kids if it was a town/ city), at the mercy of whoever wished to care, our land, wood and wattle structures thereon were attached by creditors and later sold off. As misfortunes never come singly, our grandmother in whom we had found solace and comfort during these trying times passed on the following year. Survival was not even by the bare minimum but by the maximum mercies of God. My sister went on to live with our mother's family while i stayed in a stayed in a makeshift tent-like shelter I had made in one of the bushy areas where I went on to stay for six years to come. A concerned citizen then offered to pay all my school fees from S1-S4 while studying under the difficult conditions. I remember I used to walk for 25 kilometers to and from school daily, living in no home and having no meals at school; nevertheless, God was on my side. I could not support myself after S.4; however I proceeded to a level all by myself. I could sell some sugarcanes I had grown in one of the valleys and I would also ride a borrowed bicycle for 80 kilometers to a town where my father had sought refuge to ask him for some money, of course he had no job and was desperate. I was a drowning swimmer trying to seek safety by clutching at a straw. He could give me almost nothing but I would still appreciate anything he gave because he had and still has a big heart only that he had nothing to give and one cannot give what he/she doesn't have(the principle of 'Nemo dat quod non habet' in law).

I eventually dropped out of school at the end of Senior 5 and went to Mbarara town to do an odd hotel job earning 15,000 Shs per month subject to cost of plates, cups and other utensils that I would accidentally break in the course of my work of the month. I remember one month the cost of breakages was 25,000 Shs implying that the due salary for that month was negative (-) 10,000; I had to work for another month. All that I benefitted was food and shelter in the hotel after the close of the business. In fact, I ate and drunk so much that I started to look so healthy because I was eating 'angrily' to compensate for everything and some times I would say useless prayers like 'God, why don't you let customers stay away such that I eat all the food that will be left over at the end of the dav'!

In 2002, i was admitted to a Primary Teachers' College since it was the only institution I could afford and with the help of the then Bushenyi District Chairperson Mr. Longino Ndyanabo I was offered a place despite the delayed application for admission. I graduated in 2004 among the top students countrywide. I was content but far from academic satisfaction and shortly after, I got a scholarship to study at Kabale Nursing School but still, the profession was far from my passion. I then decided



to seek a university degree, so I started reading 'A' Level books and notes which I borrowed from a friend of mine who had completed his education at Mbarara High School.

In 2005, I registered for HED/G and General paper exams which I sat for in November Kabale private hall. I scored 3ACCD(18 Points) and was admitted to Makerere for a bachelors of laws degree under private sponsorship but still I could not make it due to my financial position at that time. I opted to go to Mbarara for a bachelor of Business Administration degree. Even though tuition was equally high, I preferred Mbarara for the fact that admission terms were more negotiable than at Makerere and there were short term opportunities to do odd jobs and teach in the nearby primary schools. I could not afford anything, however I had no alternative but to go without necessities; not even a mattress, beddings, scholastic materials or tuition but the inherent determination to succeed and the rarely found faith. Entering the gate of the university was in Itself, to me, an achievement.

I started studying by 'blind' faith and before I knew it, I had, through the odd jobs, teaching in the nearby primary schools, small loans and financial assistance, paid the tuition for the first semester. I would live anywhere I had a relative, friend or a kind person and survive by God's grace. I finished the first semester and passed with a good Cumulative grade point average. I lost the jobs at the beginning of the second semester and things became worse for me. Two days to the end of second semester and to my application for a dead year, I cried bitterly to God and he answered me. There was a 'money mouth 'game on one radio: Capital Fm in Kampala, the rules of this game are, inter alia, that you speak about a given topic without repetition, deviation and hesitation for one minute and win the money which appreciates every time one fails. It had accumulated to almost 3.5 million and on 16th April 2007, I participated and miraculously won the money to my disbelief! I boarded a bus to Kampala to claim my prize despite the fact that they give the winner 30 days after he/she has won. I was to do exams on Friday or get a dead year and it was Wednesday, but God is always on time. I stayed for a night and when the chief accountant found

me the following morning after having chased me the previous day, he sat me down and asked for the whole story after which he obliged and wrote for me a draft cheque of all the outstanding tuition which I took back to Mbarara university on Friday morning and they gladly accepted and allowed me to sit for the papers that Friday evening!. I left my Bank account with the Capital FM accountant and they credited it with the balance. I got all the personal and educational basic and non basic needs and I gave glory to God.

Still, the money was not enough to take me through the next semester, that is when God sent me the Madhvani Foundation scholarship. This was my life changing moment. I saw an advert in the newspapers and did all the needful, shoved off all the discouraging words (including 'it is not genuine', 'they offer the scholarships to people they know', 'you must be introduced by a powerful person.' etc.)

I was short listed and expected to go to Makerere University (senate building) to face the panel of interviewers. I admit it was not easy during the interviews but I had prepared for them and was confident, although the little fear of the unknown incase I could not get the award still loomed. I encouraged my self in the Lord like David (1Sam 30:6).

The UACE results were released through the press and I saw 'TUMUHIMBISE FRANCO' - My name! I jumped up with joy, excitement and jubilation. We were 151 awardees and I was number 91. My life changed since then and I have never looked back. I concentrated on my studies and went on to excel. MMF made me rich academically, financially, emotionally and spiritually because I started believing God more than anything and devoted more time to serving him. I successfully completed and graduated on 30th Jan 2010. Before my final exams in May 2009, I applied for a job in Compassion International which had been advertised in the press. I

didn't have what they needed but the scholarship achievement had boosted my faith I was ready for more blessings. I was invited for interviews and excelled both in written and oral, emerging second best overall. I did not have the transcript and post graduate certificates they wanted but it didn't matter. I had applied for a junior post but upon excelling, they asked me to apply for any of the senior jobs they had advertised. I applied for the post of Project Director and was subsequently hired to my disbelief. I was allowed to complete my last semester of school and was given an appointment letter. The salary for the first two months was paid to me even before I started working. I couldn't recognize myself anymore because if it had not been for the MMF scholarship, I would be no where.

Since then I have gone on to seek more professional develpment from The Institute of Certified Public Accountants of Uganda. I did postgraduates in project planning and management, public administration and management from Makerere University and a certificate in administrative law from the Law Development Centre. I was recommended and recruited as an accountant for the East African Business Week. Today, I am studying for my CPA papers as well as a bachelors degree of laws at Makerere University Law school.

I can hardly express the fulfillment Muljhibhai Madhvani Foundation gave to me. I am very proud of my background because I believe that my ultimate measure is not where I stand in moments of comfort and convenience, but where I stand at times of challenge and controversy. I am immeasurably indebted to MMF, for changing my life. Today, I look after an orphan from my village and it is a very fulfilling experience to touch someone else's life the way mine was.

The Foundation

The Muljibhai Madhvani Foundation is a Charitable Trust. One of the Foundation's primary objectives is to maintain and promote scientific and technical education among the people of Uganda.

Retakes in more then 1 subject would entail withdrawal of Scholarship and shall not be funded by the Trust.

On completion of studies, it is expected that the awardees will, for the benefit of future scholars, make voluntary donations/contributions to the Foundation

Coverage of the Scholarship

The scholarship covers tuition fees only from second year to completion for undergraduates; and, for the entire programme of study for graduate students from the time of application/
