IKAUKOORA SUGAR

THE PAN FLOOR STAGE AT KAKIRA SUGAR WORKS

an boiling involves the simultaneous processes of removing water by evaporation until crystals appear and mass transfer until they grow. This takes place under vacuum, which helps maintain temperatures as low as possible so as to minimize colour formation and degradation of sucrose. The main objectives of the pan floor are: to crystallize as much sucrose as possible from the mother liquor (sugar solution which may be syrup or molasses), to produce sugar of the required quality and to minimize sugar losses in final molasses as much as possible. Syrup, the single input material to the pan floor, is a sugar solution from which sugar crystals have got to be created.

Crystals are created by inducing crystals in the form of either fine ground sugar or sugar (B-grade sugar) mixed with clarified cane juice that provides the surface area on which the sucrose in the syrup/ sugar solution will deposit itself. Thereafter, there is growth of the crystals by concentrating the sugar solution, which is introduced to the pan at intervals. The crystallization process is carried out in a number of stages so as to reduce the sucrose in the final molasses to economic levels. Kakira employs a three-stage boiling scheme which is concurrent with the three grades of sugar; A, B and C-grades. The Asugar is crystallized from syrup and then separated


in centrifugals to yield A-sugar and A-molasses. B-sugar is crystallized from A-molasses and then separated to yield B-Sugar and B-molasses. Csugar is crystallized from both A and B-molasses and then later separated to yield C-sugar and final molasses. The two main outputs from the pan floor are therefore A-sugar and final molasses.

In order to achieve the pan floor stage objectives, there is dire need of well-trained staff. In light of this, the pan boilers are given training opportunities to broaden their knowledge and at the same time be able to compare our performance with that of other industries. We have been able to establish an unshakable base with Vasantdada Sugar Institute, Pune, India where our staff have been training for the past 30 years. The company, based on merit recommends pan boilers who are sent to India for a course on Pan Boiling / Sugar Technology.

In the wake of technology, our most recent development on pan floor has been the installation of continuous pans. In 2006, as part of management's plan to maximize the performance of their pan staff, the pan supervisors were sent for a course in India on the maintenance of continuous pans, and their different types and advantages.

"With the ever increasing wave of technology that has hit the globe the sugar industry has been no exception. Needless to say, we are going towards better technologies and better end products."









Recognising the contribution


of Kakira's cane cutters


To give an insight into some of these extremely hardworking individuals, we profile a selection of some of the cane cutters at Kakira Sugar Works.

Opio says he has benefited a lot since and he has bought two bulls and one ox-plough that he has left at the care of his brother to do farming work back at home. "I am now planning to buy a bicycle that will help my wife and relatives in transport," he adds with a beaming smile all over his face.



Droma Goma was born in Maracha county, Arua district. Goma says that he came in 2006 from his home area with nothing in his house but now he is a proud man with three head of cattle he has purchased through his earnings in Kakira. "My two bulls help my relatives in farming, as I am in Kakira most of the time. I am now planning to collect money that will enable me to buy iron sheets for constructing my small permanent house in my village" says Goma. He encourages men who are in Arua to come and work in Kakira Sugar Works and benefit like he has.



Bosco Omirambe hails from Jongokoro County in Nebbi district is on his second year at Kakira Sugar Works. He says that he has so far bought one bull, which he was unable to buy before joining Kakira. "I am now planning to add another bull and with other cows so that when I return home I will be in position to drink milk," says Omirambe. He urges the youth who are still at home in Nebbi and other parts of the country to take up jobs with Kakira Sugar Works whilst they are still young and energetic.





- The Chobe Safari Lodge was originally constructed in 1950s and at that time was one of the jewels in Uganda's crown of tourism destinations. The panoramic views of the magnificent River Nile from the site offered a true sampling of the prime offerings of Uganda, coupled with the ample wildlife, birds, flora and fauna.
- Unfortunately, in the years of economic turmoil of the Amin regime, the long derelict Chobe Lodge underwent almost total destruction by marauding troops retreating at the end of the liberation war at the end of the 1970s. This spectacular site has been lying abandoned since then.
- The Madhvani Group, who currently own and manage Mweya Safari Lodge and Paraa Safari Lodge, were awarded the concession for Chobe Lodge in 1996. Unfortunately with the insecurity in the Region and the negative Travel Advisories issued by certain Embassies, the development of the Project could not move forward. However, with the recent positive developments in the region, the Madhvani Group has embarked on restoring Chobe Safari Lodge to its former glory.
- Plans for the development of the Lodge have been finalised to rebuild the structures and create a 5 Star Resort that will undoubtedly be in the top tier of destinations for the discerning visitor. The site on the banks of the river is ideal for fishing as well as other water-based tourism activities.

The Architects appointed by the Group for the Chobe rehabilitation are Symbion International (who were the architects for the renovation of Mweya Safari Lodge and Paraa Safari Lodge and more recently the Kampala Serena).

• After obtaining the necessary approvals from the National Environmental Management Authority and Uganda Wildlife Authority, the contractor selected has mobilised and construction has commenced at site in March 2008. The renovation of Chobe Safari Lodge will be completed by the end of April 2009. This will include renovated guest areas, 33 rooms (including 3 suites) in the main lodge building, 27 luxury tents for tourists wanting a true safari experience, a new swimming pool with bar, a viewing point on the river bank, a meeting room for seminars, a gym / health club, etc.

Located only 3 and a half hours away from Kampala by road, Chobe Safari Lodge will soon become a popular yet unique get-away in a spectacular site.

- The envisaged total project cost is over US\$ 7 million.
- Whilst augmenting tourism facilities in Uganda, this investment will also boost the economy of Northern Uganda, which has been very harshly impacted by the events of the last several years. Chobe Safari Lodge will directly offer employment for 94 persons. Further, there will be work prospects for the local population during the reconstruction programme. Moreover, there will be business opportunities for the local community to supply food produce and handcrafts as well as auxiliary services to the Lodge once it commences operations.

The rehabilitation of Chobe Safari Lodge will hence be a vital step in extending the tourism circuit in Uganda whilst making a significant contribution to the Government's poverty alleviation plans in Northern Uganda.

The Madhvani Group is proud to be able to create a landmark destination at this wonderful location.

Background

he Madhvani Foundation is a Charitable Trust which was established in 1962 on the eve of Uganda's Independence to honor the vision and memory of the founder of the Madhvani group the late Muljibhai Prabhudas Madhvani.

The Current Chairman is Mr. Sam Rutega.

The Education Trust

In 2003 The Board of Trustees for the foundation created a Scholarship Committee and instituted a scholarship programme to be awarded annually. The initial fund started with an annual grant of 350 million shillings but has since grown to 450 million in 2008. This represents the largest single annual donation from the private sector towards education in Uganda.

Key Objectives

The promotion of scientific and technical educational for the socio-economic betterment of the people of Uganda

he Muljibhai Madhvani
Education Foundation will contribute
a total of 450 million shillings towards its University
scholarship programme for the 2008/2009 academic year.

Making the announcement the Chairman of the Foundation Mr. Samson Rutega said the total figure represents an increment of 50 million shillings from last years contribution. "As Uganda's population grows and the number of students entering University increases the board was of the opinion that it is necessary to periodically augment the size of the fund in order to cater for the increased number of students".

He continued "75% of the Scholarships will be earmarked for Undergraduate courses and 25% for Postgraduate courses", the assistance is restricted only to official tuition fees and the selection of the candidates is based on the following criteria:-

- Merit, competence and ability of the candidates
- The financial status of the parents/guardians or the recipient
- The nature and availability of the courses desired

Commenting on the performance of the students who were due to graduate in 2008 Mr. S K. Iyengar the company secretary said he is very proud to announce that over 95% of the students who received support have successfully completed their courses and are now in position to find gainful employment and make a positive personal contribution to Uganda's socio/economic outlook.

He encouraged potential candidates for the 2008/9 academic calendar to apply for funding for courses from any part of the country as the selection process is open to any Ugandan student who meets the criteria.

In conclusion he noted that applications procedures for the Scholarship are already being advertised extensively in the national print media, on the internet at www.madhvanifoundation.com and at the various Universities.

ELIGIBLE DISCIPLINES

Agriculture, Biology, Business Administration, Chemistry, Commerce, Engineering, Food Science, Information Technology, Law, Hotel Management, Pharmacy, Nursing, Architecture, Veterinary Medicine, Actuarial Science, Environment studies and Human Medicine.

* The Board however, reserves the right to revise this list periodically, on the recommendation of the Scholarship Committee, to suit the relative importance of each of the disciplines in the wider framework of national capacity building.

The Number of students that have benefited from the programme: 448 students

Total amount donated so far: Shs. 1,358,000,000 billion.

Eligibility and support coverage

The student must be a Ugandan citizen

- Pursing undergraduate or post-graduate studies at university level within Uganda.
- The scholarship programme covers only tuition fees for undergraduates from the second year to the end of course for post graduates, tuition fees for the entirety of the course.

The Selection Criteria

The selection of Candidates is based on a criterion that includes:

- The Academic performance of the candidate/applicant
- The financial status of parents/guardians or the student
- Additional parameters, such as gender, regional balancing and disabilities maybe considered when a close judgement call is required.

Providing a Service to the Community...

rom offering medical services to the over 7000 individuals from the Kakira workforce and the other numerous outpatients, the story of Kakira Sugar Works Hospital is like that of an African teenager trying to widen his friendship base.

Provision of free medical care to the workers and their families is a service which the Madhvani Group has provided over the years. This was demonstrated through the launching of a 75 bed KSW hospital.

Serving a population of over 25,000 people, the hospital, according to Miss Betty Titi, Secretary to the Medical Superintendent, should be elevated to the status of a referral hospital. Services offered by the hospital include food, medical care, drugs, admissions into wards, referrals to regional hospitals, over and above services to outpatients.

Franklin Okumu, an electrician in the factory, has been diabetic for the last three decades. He is grateful for the heaven-sent opportunity to work with Kakira Sugar Factory. 'I thank God for enabling me to work here because the Company foots my medical bills,' says the sexagenarian on his way back home after being discharged. He thinks his condition has greatly improved that he should be able to resume work the very next day.

Mackline Kemirembe, 23, has a different story to tell. Wife to Joseph Odongo, a Quality Controller in the in the oil mill, Kemirembe says stomach pains sent her to the hospital bed. She says the health standards in the hospital have greatly improved over the years. Every one is appreciative of the services offered and the staff keep monitoring the patients' conditions every time, she narrates.

The wave has not left even the one and a half year old Gloria Kizza. She, too, has come to enjoy the warm touch extended by the Kakira Hospital team. A victim of malaria, Kizza is a daughter to one of the staff working in the factory. Rose Chandia, Kizza's mother, tells of the three-meals-a-day care that they receive from the hospital and more than this, the treatment her daughter received to ensure her quick recovery.

Joyce Apio, an outgrower with Kakira Sugar Works attending to Ronald Omoding, her son, suffering from diarrhea and vomiting, registers her pleasant surprise with the hospital, 'I was surprised when the nurse called us to collect food for both the patients and us'- something hardly found in other Ugandan public hospitals!

The superlatives bestowed on to the hospital are a clear testimony of Kakira Sugar Works' commitment to improve the prospects of the local community of South Busoga and the national economy of Uganda by first ensuring the good health of the people.

The future of Uganda depends upon its children; we are proud to be involved with an organisation which assists in their formative development.


